#### Welcome to Anna Strong's Laundry,

Thank you for coming to see our show in the *Great Room* of the *Old Stone House*. Today's show features original contemporary music compositions intertwined with poetry, drama, dance, and projections to create a celebration of Brooklyn's diversity today and throughout America's fight for freedom.

The Old Stone House was an early Dutch farmstead, built in 1699 by the Vechte family. In 1776, it was the culminating site of the Battle of Brooklyn - the first, and largest conflict of the American Revolution, and engulfed areas that are now familiar to all Brooklynites. On August 22, 1776, British troops disembarked along Gravesend Bay and the American War for Independence began in earnest. The British overran the Americans' outer defenses, leaving the Continental Army on the brink of defeat. In a feat of sheer heroism, General William Alexander organized several companies of Maryland and Delaware soldiers and attacked the British positions at the Old Stone House. This provided a brief window for the Americans caught behind enemy lines to escape across the Gowanus Creek to the safety of the American fortifications on Brooklyn Heights. Two nights later, under the cover of darkness and fog, General Washington effected his legendary retreat across the East River, saving his army to fight another day. In the late 1800s, the Old Stone House was the clubhouse for the Brooklyn Dodgers. And in the 1930s, it was the centerpiece of Washington Park, rebuilt by Robert Moses.

Concrete Timbre, Inc. is proud to be in such a historic setting, fulfilling our mission to create and produce events that intertwine fascinating stories, movement, visuals, and media with our live contemporary music. Tonight, you'll see and hear genres ranging from jazz to poetry to electro-acoustic to classical by creative artists working in imaginative ways and combining and enhancing the artistic disciplines. This is a largely collaborative effort that brings together disparate voices and concepts that involves the artistry of some very remarkable people—some who have worked with us on past productions, and some working with us for the first time. We are honored to present our work to you.

Concrete Timbre's artist leaders want to thank the 19 artists involved. Two of our key beliefs are that artists need to provide opportunities for other artists, and that our creative skills can be applied to development and production. ## Short statements from an Interesting Group of Artists! see full bios and information at www.concretetimbre.com/artists.html

Roger Bonair-Agard intended to pursue a law career but found himself instead exploring the seediest sides of New York City life.

Mark Farnen I'm a seeker, and this is why I write. The play may start as an idea or image or first line, and I listen for what comes next and then next, and before I know it, a little dance has begun between these characters and me. They'll start to move one way, and I'll follow. I'll shift the movement, and they'll follow. And so on until there's something new before me, both of the world and the world of me, something I didn't know about either of us - but now do. It's a wonderful co-creation!

**Lynnette Freeman** is a storyteller, and purveyor and procurer of love in all it's forms. Her work as a performer, and writer, and dreamer stem from a need to give voice to what it is to be human. A child of the moon and a Libra, she loves hugs, cuddles, French fries, travel, yoga, dancing, chocolate and to be barefooted on grass.

**Nancy Greening** loves directing and writing plays. Her favorite work represents to her the notion that the inner life can transform the world, and the inner life can be shared.

**Cary Hite** I am a sports enthusiast. I enjoy eating good food. Family Guy and American Dad make me laugh. I think about doing yoga.

**Carmen Kordas** I generate all of my footage in the physical world, and morph it into the fluid shapes of dreams. There, they take a life of their own: they contort, grow, fuse, and age—they remind us where life originated and where we might be all headed – off into an unknown dimension.

Manuela Lechler, saxophonist, composer and improviser: "I love music! Music is the magic carpet that carries us where we wish to go... Let's travel together!"

**Allan Markowitz**, I love the story of why the French say, "Merde" instead of "Break a leg." I never played any role (at all) on Law & Order. I do play *Malegueña*, *Chopsticks*, and sometimes Bach's *Preludes*.

**Patrice Miller** is a director/choreographer, which is a great career path if you love to research things endlessly, make something new out of them, and sweat a lot. Which is just what she loves. She also loves prehistoric creatures, and is still trying to find her dinosaur play and/or hominid ballet. An amateur social scientist, she believes the truth is out there. She also does weddings.

**Robert Morton**, I am a geek. There, I said it. I love to figure out the art of new programs and gadgets. I like the word obsession. I still yearn to discover the espresso ottimo, bend the perfect blues note on my Fender, compose the Eiffel Tower in some imaginative way, capture the morning light, and see it with my own eyes!

**Chris Kadis Moscato** My passion is world music fusion but I often rely heavily on processed sounds. I create music because I see the effect it has on people as a universal language that musicians & non-musicians can understand and be moved by.

**Kyoko Oyobe,** I am a piano player, composer, arranger, and band leader. I love cooking. I think that cooking food and composing music are very similar. And eating the food and playing the music are very similar... I love sharing them with people!

**Milica Paranosic** has established herself as one of New York's finest and most daring composers, performance artists, producers, and technologists. Praised by The New York Times as "Amazing... astonishing", Milica strives to create new sound worlds in which contrasting concepts vividly coexist in unique textures

**Lynne Procope** Deeply rooted in the political and personal, she gifts her readers with a critical view of the world, and a new and daring way of looking at the self. Resonant with clarity, her poems are frank, saucy and introspective. Her poems remember, her poems teach!

**Richard Sage** likes explore his artistic side building equipment for live shows.

**James Stokes** I'm one of those guys who cries during movies and I love it. I'm always prone to start long winded rants, mostly about comic books. I randomly start singing songs or quoting t.v. shows for no real reason. I'm over-zealous, over-passionate and that's how I like it.

**Anna Strong**, Patriot who endured life in British-occupied Setauket after saving her husband from British prison and sending him and their 7 children to greater safety in Connecticut. The Culper Spy Ring in Setauket used Anna's waterfront property in their missions, and code *355* for *lady* to mean Anna in spy missions to *727* (New York City). Anna used her own laundry to signal to a boat in the Long Island Sound where letters to Washington were hidden. After the war, Anna had another baby whose name was George Washington Strong. The powerful symbol of Anna using the laundry to communicate reminds us of the wide range of artistic expression we celebrate as part of the Concrete Timbre mission.
